

Your Faction: Indeterminate

The Indeterminate members of the Jesuit Council do not have an opinion (**at the start of the game**) as to whether or not a mission should be sent further into New France.

Therefore, you should be open to listening to the arguments of either side. If you are persuaded by one, vote with that faction. If you are not persuaded by either, you may abstain from the vote.

General Directive

The goal of this game is to use the movie *Black Robe* as a “primary” source. Imagine it as a record of an actual mission that has made it back to the Jesuit Council.

The Jesuit Council is now set to decide on whether or not there will be another mission sent to New France, based upon the information contained in the narrative account (*Black Robe*) and other knowledge which is contained on your character sheet.

You are a member of the Jesuit Council, and you get to vote for, against, or abstain to help decide whether or not to send a mission further into New France.

As an Indeterminate, you do not have to vote in a block with your fellow indeterminates. You may choose to vote for whichever side you fancy.

Your Character:

Denis was born in a small town in Paris in 1621. He was quiet as a boy but he enjoyed learning with the town preacher about God and the Trinity. He has become more outspoken, but still thoughtful, as he has grown. He has not gone on any missions but has read widely and spoken with members of his brotherhood who have returned from mission work all over the world. He also was tasked with serving some of the Jesuit Council as they were preparing to argue their case for accommodation before the Pope. Now, he is a member of the Council.

Secret Objective:

Denis, you are keenly aware of the latest Chinese rites controversy and you want to do everything you can to avoid it happening again in the New World. Especially in New France. No matter on where or if a mission is set, you want the Council to take a strong stance against accommodation.

Convince the Jesuit Council to send a pamphlet to all current New France missions with guidelines for missionaries to follow. These guidelines are to be explicitly anti-accommodation.
